## NEWS FROM KORA COUNCIL

The first ever Mobility Fair, “Keep on Moving Oberlin: Balance and Movement for Seniors,” took place on March 19 at Oberlin Community Services. To our Mobility Fair Committee it was like seeing your child take its first steps!

Our volunteers arrived to set up the space, creating areas for the separate “stations,” moving tables around until they felt they got it “right.” Would the representatives from Drug Mart and No Place Like Home show up to display and explain the use of various assistance devices? (They did!) A representative from the Oberlin Senior Center came bearing information about its balance course. Jill Connore from Fitness and Kris Koepp from Therapy came with their own equipment for fitness and balance assessments. (What was Kris going to use that square of paper for?) Eileen and Nancy were busy figuring out how to introduce dance for mobility in a tight space, arranging and rearranging chairs. Meanwhile Dan helped set up the keyboard, and Dianne settled in and began to organize her music. All the while, the OCS food distribution center on the other side of the room was in full swing. More Kendal volunteers showed up and took an area for observation and evaluation. Carla VanDale, Chair of our Committee, worked with Cindy Andrews, Executive Director of OCS, on moving furniture out of the way, figuring out where to put the refreshment table, and setting up the registration table. (Whew! I think this baby is ready to walk!) Will anyone come?

They did. About 35 in all. Cindy Andrews’ wise advice was to hold the Fair on a busy Thursday at OCS. Clients drawn by curiosity and the encouragement of our volunteers wandered over and before they knew it were having their balance tested! Other Oberlin residents, and a few

Kendal at Home folks, joined them. One lady, delighted to discover a footed cane, was overjoyed when the Drug Mart representative gave it to her. Another needed a longer cane. Good information on Medicare was available. Participation at each station earned a ticket for the raffle organized by Cindy. Twelve folks signed up for the Senior Center balance course. Carla was amazed to see it all happening, and Cindy commented on the good energy in the room.

There are many forms of creative expression. The colors, textures, and varieties of art are integral to life here in this community. Art needs imagination and keen observation of the world around us. Is it too much of a reach to suggest that bringing a mobility fair into being, where such a thing

had not been done before, is also an act of creative expression? It began with imaginative suggestions from our residents about unmet needs we might address with a grant from Kendal Charitable Funds. It took shape through the willingness of our grant committee to “work the clay” of these ideas into a design that met the criteria of bringing together services for our own seniors and community residents with less access to resources. The committee appointed to see it through experienced setbacks, but regrouped, pressed innumerable details into a working model, and produced a Mobility Fair! Maybe you’d like to help create the next event, scheduled for June 17 at the Oberlin Public Library?

**News & Views: Foreign Affairs.** Topics are taken from the latest “Great Decisions” briefing book from the Foreign Policy Assn. Fridays, 10:30am to noon. **April 3** (see p. 5), Oberlin College Professor Jafar Mahallati will discuss **Sectarianism in the Middle East; May 1**, Jim and Ann Helm, **India Changes Course.** No registration or fee.

**An Introduction to Japanese Woodblock Prints.** Three lectures on Japanese woodblock prints from the late 1600’s through the 1930’s cover historical context, subjects, techniques and major figures. Many of the works are on view in a special exhibition in AMAM’s Ripin Gallery: “A Life in Prints: Mary A. Ainsworth and the Floating World.” An Oberlin graduate, Ainsworth left her collection of some 1,500 Japanese prints to the Museum in 1950. Presenter: Dr. Kevin Greenwood, Joan L. Danforth Asst. Curator of Asian Art, who developed the exhibit. Mon., 10:30am to Noon, **Apr. 6 to 20** (3 sessions). Fee: \$20. (Class #5338)

**Alice Munro’s Final Fictions.** In three classes, you will consider the works of Munro within the larger context of Canadian literature; examine the relationship between her works and her life; and, finally, discuss several short stories in her recently published “Dear Life,” which she has said will be her last collection of stories. Munro, winner of the 2013 Nobel Prize in Literature, calls the final four stories in this volume her “most autobiographical.” Presenter: Mary Kirtz Van Nortwick, Professor Emerita of English and Dir. of Canadian Studies, U. of Akron. ### **BUS: All About Water Tuesday, April 14 9:30am-3:30pm**

First we'll head west to Castalia, south of Sandusky, famous for its “Blue Hole.” Access to this blue hole has been closed but we'll visit another one.

Then we'll tour the State of Ohio Cold Water Fish Hatchery that uses water from the blue hole. The facility will be in the process of removing rainbow trout that have reached catchable size for placement in state lakes, reservoirs and ponds. The hatchery also raises steelhead trout for stocking four rivers that feed Lake Erie.

Next stop is Old Woman Creek State Nature Preserve where we'll eat our own brown bag lunches in the Visitors Center. There are short easy trails outside the Center that we can follow down to the estuary observation deck. Or watch the many birds from the Center's window area facing its well-used bird feeders. Watch for eagles!

We will have a special treat: Scott and Adie Orcutt will be with us to help us locate and identify birds both at the hatchery and at Old Woman Creek! Questions? Ask Pat Talbot.

## Sunday Movies in Whittier at 7:00pm

**April 5 - Harvey (1950):** James Stewart gives one of his best performances as good-natured tippler Elwood P. Dowd whose constant companion is Harvey, a six-foot-tall rabbit that only he can see. ## News & Views: Foreign Affairs Fri., April 3 - 10:30am - AUD

Oberlin College Prof. M. Jafar Mahallati will present **Sectarianism in the Middle East**, a discussion informed by his own deep knowledge of the issues as well as by the “Great Decisions” briefing book. Many of the conflicts in the Middle East have been blamed on sectarianism, a politicization of ethnic and religious identity. From the crisis in Iraq and Syria to the tension between Iran and Saudi Arabia, the struggle between Sunni and Shi’i groups for dominance is tearing the region apart and shows no signs of abating. But for all the religious discourse permeating the conflict, much of its basis is political, not religious. How have governments manipulated sectarian differences? Finally, what is the U.S. doing about the conflict? No registration or fee. **All are welcome.**

## Severe Weather Safety Practices at Kendal

With spring’s arrival comes the threat of severe weather, ranging from strong thunderstorms with damaging winds and heavy rains to tornados. This severe weather can occur any time of the year, but especially in April through August. We have a Safety Plan and Procedure at Kendal that must be followed by both residents and staff members to avoid injury in the event of a Weather Warning. Please acquaint yourself with the following recommended shelter areas within our community:

- **Heiser Community Center:** Public restrooms, auditorium, and interior corridors **away from windows.**
- **Apartment Building:** First floor in bathrooms, laundry rooms, stairwells or corridors **away from windows.**
- **Stephens Care Center:** Public restrooms, bathing rooms, interior corridors, or resident bathrooms **away from windows.**
- **Cottages:** Bathrooms or closets inside cottages; **away from windows.**

**Please note that there will be no admittance once the play has started until the first scene break.**



Since these sirens are sometimes difficult to hear, please rely on radios (including weather radios), computers and TV messages to stay updated on the latest weather advisories. Let’s stay safe this season!

## Welcome Kendal's New Residents

### Judith Appleton

Born in the sleepy village of Cornwall, NY, tucked into the Hudson Highlands, I grew up at West Point. My father was professor of physical education there for 33 years, one of a handful of permanent civilians in officers' uniforms. Our little neo-Gothic early 19th-Century house just below the parade ground looked up the Hudson River to Storm King Mountain and beyond. It was an idyllic childhood in a handsome college setting.

- Oberlin College ('62). Vienna Language Program with the Reichard family. Universität des Saarlandes (one year);
- University of Rochester Medical School ('67). Led summer student exchange programs for Experiment in International Living;
- Internship, six months OB-GYN residency, Cooperstown, New York;
- Peace Corps staff physician, Ceylon (1969-70);
- Family medicine residency, five years with Rochester Neighborhood Health Centers;
- Medical coordinator/college physician, Oberlin College, 20 years. My Peace Corps director in Ceylon, Stan Reynolds, was also father of a welcoming family who have remained dear friends for 46 years. Stan and I married in 1995, a few years after his wife died. Prior to the Peace Corps, he was priest-in-charge of an Episcopal mission in Zamboanga, Philippines. After, he was overseas director of a nongovernmental organization in village-level development for 17 years. We had some special years together before his health began to fail. It was a long and beautiful friendship. He died the same week Kendal notified me the

cottage was available. It's been a hard move here.

International friends have provided opportunities over the decades for visits to rural hospitals and bush clinics in Colombia (where I naively stumbled into a drug ring in Leticia, Amazon, in 1971), Dominican Republic, Mexico, Togo, Tanzania, Kenya, India, Ceylon, and China (1981). All have their stories.

Other activities: hiking (including Kilimanjaro), diving medicine (certified Dive Med International), marine biology (Bermuda Biological Station), Lorain County Free Clinic, Cleveland Metroparks, Family Promise.

### Carolyn "Lynn" Killean

I was born in Columbus but left Ohio six months later. Early family moves included Batavia, NY, and Racine, WI. I consider Racine my hometown because I graduated from high school there and was later married in that city. Meanwhile, I attended Carleton College in Northfield, MN, for two years before transferring to the University of Michigan. While there, I enrolled in the new department of Near Eastern Studies. I was required for my major to study classical Arabic. Two years later, after graduation and marriage, I got a job working as a secretary, my only really employable skill as a woman in those days. After the birth of two daughters and separating from my husband, I thought I'd be tied to that boring job for the rest of my life. However, Sputnik in 1957 saved me and launched me into an academic career. My knowledge of Arabic won me a National Defense Education Act government fellowship for five years of graduate study in Ann Arbor, from which I emerged with a PhD in linguistics. My research interest focused on how literary Arabic was used in the Arab oral media. This took me to Egypt first and, after being hired by the University of Chicago, I also spent time in Jordan and, briefly, Syria. I taught literary Arabic and linguistics for 29 years while my girls and I lived in Hyde Park. Upon retirement, I moved to Houston, TX, to help my older daughter raise two children. There I taught English as a second language to primarily Mexican immigrants who wanted to understand their children's teachers. After some health issues developed, I was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease and entered an assisted-living facility there. At my brother Len Garver's memorial service in June 2014, I experienced the special atmosphere of Kendal and decided to move here.


