Use the Past to Serve the Present: Archaeology and Politics in China.

This three-part series will introduce some of the most dramatic discoveries in 20th Century Chinese archaeology, and show how some of the artifacts uncovered have been employed in 20th-21st century Chinese politics. 1. Art of the Shang dynasty (c.1600-1046 BCE), how proof of that dynasty’s existence (and therefore the antiquity of Chinese culture) contributed to China’s 20th century resurgence as a world power. 2. Art of the Warring States period (c.450-221 BCE), how a large set of bells from the period discovered in 1977 appeared both during a ceremony for the return of Hong Kong to Chinese rule and in the Beijing Olympics. 3. Details of the spectacular discoveries associated with the tomb of China’s First Emperor (259-210 BCE), including the famed Terra Cotta Army and other recent findings, how the legacy of this emperor has become intertwined with that of Mao Zedong (1893-1976), the founder of the People’s Republic of China. 2. If you find a clear time on the calendar for your program, you must fill out a Blue Reservation Request Form for the Auditorium, available at the Heiser Reception Desk. Check everything that is important, such as the set-up of the chairs, request to open the back doors for a larger audience, request for posters and/or advertising on Channel 27. Be sure to fill out the back of the Blue Form with your exact audio/visual needs. A sentence or two on the topic and speaker will provide information for posters and Channel 27. All of

this is very important for things to run smoothly.

3. If your program will be distracted by events in the Heiser Lounge area, you should also reserve the Lounge for the same time period. If you plan to hold a reception, a Gold Form for the Lounge should be filled out by Ann Pilisy.

“The Wright Sister”

**Harry Haskell

Harry Haskell, prize-winning author and editor, unravels the mystery of the “third” Wright brother, their sister Katharine, in “Maiden Flight,” his work of “creative nonfiction.” Katharine Wright married his grandfather, Pulitzer Prize-winning newspaper editor Henry J. Haskell. Torn between love and her duty to family, she agonized for months before making the break with her brother Orville. The book sheds new light on the central role Katharine played in the Wright brothers’ private lives, as well as her often misunderstood contribution to their scientific work. In 2011, the Carnegie Endowment for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education named Volk U.S. Professor of the Year. The pendulum of Latin American politics is swinging rightward once again. The forces of change have more to do with socioeconomics than ideology. Dramatic economic and political crises have coincided in countries like Brazil and Venezuela. Benefiting Kendal Residents Assistance Fund and Community Charities

Our two on-site apartment sales in February and early March were a great success! Thanks to all the shoppers from our Kendal and Oberlin communities, we made \$4,217 for the Residents Assistance Fund!

And thank you to our volunteers and Kendal staff who work hard to make these sales successful.

Another on-site sale was held in mid-March – this one consisting solely of furniture and kitchenware from a number of donors. We appreciate Marketing's cooperation, which enabled us to continue to use Apartment #158 through March. Proceeds from the two March special sales will be reported next month as part of the March total monthly sales figure. Officially, Resale Shop deposits to the Residents Assistance Fund for the month of February totaled \$1,743.25. Due to a processing delay, this figure does not reflect the late February sale; proceeds from that sale will be reported next month.

DID YOU KNOW? You don't need to use an envelope when paying for items less than \$6. When there is no description on the price tape, only a price, just put your payment -- bills, change or checks -- directly in the cash box. Even when the total for all your purchases is more than \$5, no tape or envelope is necessary. You only need to use envelopes when the price tape has a description (e.g., "Glass Vase \$6").

An Update on Jameson House

Foundational to the Kendal at Oberlin experience are Kendal's "Values and Practices" which honors, among other pillars, "Enhancing the Quality of Life for those we serve...we seek to honor each person's "human rights and needs to be treated as an individual...and to have challenges and limitations compensated for in ways that preserve dignity and respect..."

Throughout 2017 we are fervently pursuing a quest to refine and strengthen the way we, as an entire Kendal community, support our neighbors and friends encountering cognitive impairment. We are doing this with three focuses across our continuum:

- **Empowering Education** - Kendal at Oberlin staff are partnering with KORA's Thoughtful Medicine Committee to provide information to residents this year on supporting significant others and Kendal neighbors living with dementia.
- **Meaningful Engagement** - Central to this pursuit is grounding our Jameson House and Stephens Care Center programming on person-centered principles, creating and crafting purposeful activities tailored to the personal preferences of each individual.
- **Enhancing Environment** - Fashioning Jameson House with features that enhance the quality of life for residents living there.

One aspect distinguishing Jameson House from other areas of Stephens Care Center is its being a "small house." In other words, it is designed to be and to function as a home, complete with living spaces for reading, relaxing, enjoying nature, and playing music or board games. It will also have a country kitchen, bedrooms and a relaxing bathing spa. It is designed to feel like a large home with trusting relationships between residents and care partners (supporting staff members).

We will not permit people to pass through Jameson House, as a distinctive resident home, to get to the pool and fitness rooms. A home is not a "shortcut." The route to the Fitness Wing has been permanently altered through Whittier. However, that is not to say all entry to Jameson House is closed off. Quite the opposite. We want to encourage everyone living at Kendal at Oberlin to maintain their friendships with those living in Jameson House by visiting often, participating in household life, or perhaps escorting a friend outside Jameson House with a stroll to the Langston or the Library, or for a leisurely walk outside. We will continue to be intentional to maintain the essence of community-connectedness throughout our continuum, and Jameson House will be no exception.

Will the doors to Jameson House be closed? Yes, but those closed doors are no different than the closed doors to your cottage or apartment. You are encouraged to ring the doorbell to announce your arrival and come in. The doors will not be "locked," but will latch and alert care partners when resident engagement or an escort is needed. We are hoping there will be times when the doors are open. This will occur as the Jameson House residents' needs change.

Throughout our Kendal continuum, we will provide supports enabling all to live their most resilient lives.

Medication Reminders

As a reminder, residents needing assistance with medication refills are asked to notify the Health and Wellness Clinic two weeks prior to running out to ensure a timely refill.

Most pharmacies, including Drug Mart, have easy-to-follow prompts on their prescription refill phone lines. Drug Mart refills are delivered to Kendal at Oberlin on weekdays and may be picked up during Health and Wellness Clinic hours, Monday-Friday 8:30am-4:30pm.

If you ask the RN Nurse Manager in the Stephens Care Center for your delivered prescription after HWC hours, she will give you a time when you can pick it up. RN Nurse Managers are not able to provide immediate prescription pick-up service.

For those residents with a Kendal at Oberlin physician, requests for renewed prescriptions (when a refill order has expired) also require two week notice. This allows time for the Kendal Nurse Practitioner to review medical record notes, lab results, current medication list, and so on, before writing a new prescription. The Nurse Practitioner may ask to see a resident in the clinic for a face-to-face visit before the prescription is ordered. This is to assure quality and safety. Laura Gienke, our "new" Nurse Practitioner, started March 27; it will take her time to become familiar with all Kendal residents and their unique medical histories. We thank you for your patience during this transition.

In addition to our form, Dr. Newman, our Medical Director, has supplied five worksheets that she would like filled out and returned to inform her of our late-in-life priorities.

Arbor Day 2017 Education Day

The John Bartram Arboretum at Kendal at Oberlin will celebrate Arbor Day this year with two events. The first is an Education Day on Friday, April 28 with Alan Siewert, an Ohio Natural Resources Urban Forester. Mr. Siewert will make a presentation on "Healthy Trees: Five Steps to a Thriving Urban Forest" at 10:00am in Heiser Auditorium, followed at 1:00pm by a walking tour of the Arboretum and a debriefing session at 2:30pm in the Education Center Training Room. Everyone is invited, including the public. Alan Siewert is an excellent educator, leading the Tree Academy training that several of our residents and staff have taken. He is very familiar with our Arboretum and has already contributed much to its improvement.

The next event will be a Memorial Tree planting in Westwood Cemetery on Friday, May 26, in partnership with the city of Oberlin and to honor early Kendal founders. Further details will be published in the May *Kendalight*.

Report from the Arboretum: The Pest that Causes the Most Damage to Urban Trees

It may come as a surprise to you that the pest that causes the most damage to trees is human beings. We at Kendal have not understood trees' needs and have had many shortcomings in how we have treated them. Fortunately, by having our Tree Commission Academy training here with Alan Siewert, we have become much more aware of our mistakes. One, for instance, is planting a tree too deep and piling a thick cone of mulch up against its trunk. Our Arbnet grant has enabled us to get to work to remedy this problem, and Oberlin College Environmental Study students are currently assessing how widespread this problem is at Kendal at Oberlin. Another huge problem is compaction of soil. It is easy to blame this on the construction we have been doing, but that is not the whole of it. Each of us may be part of the problem. Tree roots need more respect: they are the most vital organ of a tree. The roots of trees are mainly in the top 12 in. and need loose soil around them to access moisture, vital nutrients and oxygen. Driving carts or walking frequently near trees compacts the soil. Do you cut across grassy areas by trees, compacting the soil when you

don't need to? Some of us do that when we go for a walk for exercise. There are good reasons to have sidewalks -- use them. Salting our roads and sidewalks damages plants. Safety is a concern and we need to use some salt. However, Kathy Smith, a program director for forestry in the State of Ohio who visited here in February, suggested that we mix salt products with coarse grit to reduce the amount of salt used. She also suggested vacuuming or sweeping the extra salt up rather than blowing it into the grassy areas to clean sidewalks as we have been doing. Pets add to the problem by urinating on or near tree trunks. Sam Bishop, education director for Trees New York, says it is especially frustrating when he runs into people who believe that their fur children are actually doing the tree a favor, watering it and fertilizing it. "But no, no, no, it is not good for the plant." Other ways humans are pests are through improper pruning and gashing tree trunks with tools like weedwackers or lawnmowers. Turning to the positive, on April 28 at our Second Annual Arbor Day Celebration, Alan Siewert will be telling us about "Healthy Trees: Five Steps to a Thriving Urban Forest?". Stay tuned! *-Anne Helm for the Arboretum Committee*

Ask any of his pupils: Doyle brings out the best in us. With the serve, too. They proved tough to return. But Doyle will teach us how. That's why we line up for him.
