Looking Ahead: Updating the Strategic Plan for Kendal

Residents are moving into the new Assisted Living Whittier rooms now, bringing to a close the three major phases of our 10-year Master Plan which resulted in more than 17 million dollars of campus improvement at Kendal at Oberlin since 2005.

Last fall, we began the process of updating our Strategic Plan with the help of the Kendal community. All board members, department heads and more than 60 residents voluntarily submitted input on our **Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT)**.

Kendal recently engaged an outside firm, ParenteBeard, to conduct a marketing study, the first in ten years. It was charged to look at how KatO stands up to trends in retirement living on a state, regional and national basis; compares with competition in North-east Ohio; and compares to six area CCRC's in regard to occupancy, design, contract types, etc. Its recommendations will help us consider how we

reposition our Kendal campus for the next 10-15 years, particularly to ensure that the design of almost 200 "classic" cottages and apartments built in 1993 remain attractive to the market.

In April, Kendal received responses to a Request for Proposal (RFP) from five architectural firms that specialize in designing senior living campuses.

Over the summer we will choose one firm and begin the serious work of defining how Kendal can remain an attractive and competitive retirement community yet at the same time assure affordability and full occupancy.

FROM KORA COUNCIL . . .

What fund-raising efforts does KORA (Kendal at Oberlin Residents Association) engage in? Normally there are three "campaigns" every year for contributions (which are tax-deductible). In the early fall we raise the money used for our own KORA activities. Our budget for 2012 is \$23,555. The largest categories (over \$1,000) are Communication (\$4,150), Sports and Recreation (\$2,060), Eureka (\$2,200), Library (\$1,600), Art (\$1,685), and KORA's own expenses (\$1,310). KORA also holds a Reserve Fund of \$20,000. Our KORA Treasurer Joe Palmieri also handles the money that comes in and goes back out for copier use, our many trips, and other events.

Twice a year we seek contributions to say "thank you" to our loyal and hard-working Kendal staff. Since gratuities, tips and gifts to staff are prohibited, residents may show their appreciation by contributing to the Staff Holiday Fund (late fall) and the Staff Vacation Fund (late spring). Contributions are not obligatory. You have been promised certain services for which gratuities are neither required nor expected. However, contributing to these funds allows you to acknowledge the service our staff members provide.

Much of this service is behind the scenes. Our laundry staff are among these "hidden helpers." They work all three shifts every weekday and all day on weekends processing about 900 lbs. of laundry a day. KORA Council at its April meeting gave special congratulations to these staff for receiving from Stephens Care Center residents in the recent state nursing home survey a near-perfect "satisfaction rating" for their handling of personal laundry -- a category that in many nursing homes gets a very low rating.

You should by now have received a letter in your open box soliciting your support of the **Staff Vacation Fund**. In 2011 this fund totaled nearly \$34,000; 247 residents gave an average of about

Library Notes

The Shredder Box Revisited: The Shredder Box in the Library was overstuffed for about two weeks before it was emptied on April 13. It was still on an eight-week emptying cycle instead of the intended four-week cycle. But another reason for its overfilled condition is that some residents have placed inappropriate material in the Box. Paperwork such as corporate and mutual fund annual reports and ads for potential investments, which contain no personal information, do not need to be shredded. Occasionally even magazines and newspapers have been found in the Shredder Box! As a help to residents, a plastic bin for recycling paper that does not need to be shredded has been placed beside the Shredder Box. *-Russ Bimber*

Kendal's Care and Nurturing

Care and Nurturing is an "umbrella" committee of KORA under which are six subcommittees. Chairs meet quarterly as a group in order to exchange experiences and prevent overlap of their activities and purposes.

Buddy System (Gay Fischer): Residents who live alone in the cottages or apartments are encouraged to choose a buddy and develop a mutually convenient signal or contact plan, so that each person is checked on once a day.

Supporting Friends (Margaret-Ann Ellis): Kendal volunteers, who have completed special training and are scheduled at the request of staff, spend time with seriously ill Stephens Care Center (SCC) residents. They also help with mail and other needs.

Memorial Services (Nancy Garver): This committee provides help to the family of a deceased resident in planning a memorial service.

Stephens Center Shoppers (Peggy Reid): This committee shops weekly for small items for SCC residents.

Pushers (Lavona Olmsted): This new committee will assist residents who want to attend activities in the Heiser.

Medical Companions (Don Norenberg): They accompany residents who need assistance and emotional support, delivering instructions, etc., for off-campus medical appointments when arranged by staff. *-Eileen Payton, Care and Nurturing*

process began with a SWOT (summary in Library). We will continue to engage the community on these important topics that go beyond committee input. Welcome Kendal's New Residents

My birth certificate lists the date and place as 1942 and Brooklyn. Formal education was provided by the New York City public school system and the City College of New York. Despite distractions like paying jobs, late nights spent at Gerdes Folk City listening to an unknown kid from Minnesota (Bob Dylan) and hitch-hiking excursions through the United States, Canada and Mexico I managed to obtain a BS in physics.

At this point I was sick of sitting in a classroom. The newly formed Peace Corps had great appeal but presented serious financial barriers. And Vietnam damped visions of heading to Haight Ashbury so I signed on Columbia University's deep sea oceanographic research ship, the Vema. Eight months at sea taught me what it means to work 24/7 for weeks on end and enabled me to see lots of water and the grungy (interesting) side of ports on several continents. The experience also caused novels by Conrad to come alive in a new way. When I returned to academe at Syracuse University it took me eight years to complete a PhD, again in physics.

Years later, while working on a text on space satellite design, something sparked and the pleasures of writing, literature and languages became a more central part of my life. This led to a very satisfying stint working with the editorial group that produced the Public Radio program "The Great Atlantic Radio Conspiracy" (if you're not part of the conspiracy you're part of the problem).

These profiles have challenging length constraints, so details of marriage,

divorce, human rights activities in Guatemala during the early 1990s, service as an international observer in a small Mayan village in La Selva Lacandona (Mexico) during the Zapatista uprising, and a seven-day trek across the Sonora Desert (Migrant Trail Walk) -- must be left to your imagination.

Where Were You in 1940?

The U.S. Census is conducted every ten years. Every census gives different information, according to what questions Congress decides should be included. Census records are kept private for 72 years and the 1940 records were released in early April 2012. This is the first census in which some of us here at Kendal may find ourselves listed.

The 1940 census is available free on line. As long as you know the state, street, and hopefully a nearby cross street of your family residence, it can be an easy job to find your family listing. Go to 1940census.archives.gov, click on "Get started" and follow directions. Questions included on this unique census include all the usual personal information, but also specific questions about the value of the family house (or rent paid), employment (or lack thereof), income during 1939, place of birth, location of the family in 1935. This "snapshot" of your family 72 years ago provides a fascinating picture of the time just after the Great Depression, and specifically your family's particular situation. Good luck in making a search!

Why Recycle?

Recycling reduces the: amount of land fill; need to use up natural resources; amount of energy spent to harvest resources; and amount of energy spent to transport resources.
