### **Big Bus: Cleveland Museum of Art Friday, November 16 9:00am to 4:00pm**

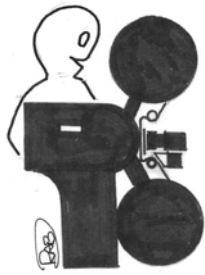
There are so many reasons to visit CMA now. We’ll visit the magnificent new atrium as well as the new café and gift shop! And **Special Exhibits:**

The month of September started well with a special sale off campus, located in the Blue House on Main Street. We joined the Oberlin town-wide yard sale. ## A Day for Advance Directives and DNRs

**Do you need to get your Health Care Power of Attorney and Living Will in order?** We have planned a day for you to do it -- and we will provide help. Perhaps you need a refresher. Do you know the difference between a Living Will and a DNR order? If you have difficulty answering that question, plan to attend **“Advance Directives and DNRs – and a Little Bit of MOLST”** on Wednesday, November 7. The day starts with a presentation in the Heiser Auditorium from 10:30-11:30am. Advance directive documents will be available. Then drop by the Health and Wellness Clinic between 3:00-5:00pm for personal consultations -- and to file your completed advance directives. Advance Directives in a nutshell: Choose who you trust to make medical decisions for you by completing a **Health Care Power of Attorney**. Direct the care that you would want in the future if you become terminally ill by completing a **Living Will**. A **DNR order** is a medical order directing health providers not to attempt resuscitation whenever your heart or breathing stops. Questions? Call Social Services (775-9813)

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## Become an AARP Tax Aide for 2013

Tax season may seem far away but AARP Tax-Aide, a free, volunteer-run tax preparation service, is seeking volunteers for the coming tax season. Good interpersonal skills are important, but you don't need to be a math whiz to help! Training occurs during the day in January. Classes cover areas of federal returns of particular importance to older and lower-income taxpayers, including pensions, IRAs, sale of stock and homes, earned income and child tax credits, as well as Ohio returns. After training, you take an open-book test to become certified. You are then assigned to one of 11 Lorain County sites to prepare returns, working at least four daytime hours a week between February 1 and April 15, 2013. (You can arrange short absences.) Tax-Aide, sponsored by AARP in cooperation with the IRS, has assisted seniors and low-to-middle income taxpayers for more than 40 years. 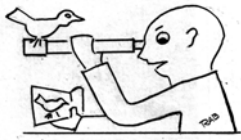

## Kendal's Re-Accreditation Efforts a Great Success!

In August, Kendal at Oberlin hosted three volunteers from CARF-CCAC (Continuing Care Accreditation Commission). The result was the renewal of KatO's accreditation for a five-year term (to mid-2017) as a Continuing Care Retirement Community; Person-Centered Long-Term Care Community; and Dementia Care Specialty Program. The final report, available in the Kendal Library, gives full details of the successful process and outcome. KatO received five exemplary ratings based on our financial performance with ratios in the 75th or higher percentile compared with other accredited communities. KatO's long list of strengths are detailed in the report. Many of these strengths have been part of our 19-year history, but some were new, such as the Board's commitment to using e-Governance tools. KatO's promotion of intergenerational experiences on campus and off was noted; KatO is one of five Intergenerational Communities across the U.S., and earned a Program of Distinction from Washington DC-based Generations United. KatO was recognized for significant engagement and participation of those it serves by way of decision-making and input. It was also recognized for its strong retention of staff, competitive wages and benefits and a focus on person-centered programming to assure quality of life for residents. KatO was pleased to be offered team consultation in seven areas that are optional ways to improve our operations. **This year's report now offers a Benchmarking Comparison of Kendal at Oberlin against other communities that receive a Five-Year Accreditation, Three-Year, One-Year or nonaccreditation. Accreditation reports now include bar graphs that show Kendal at Oberlin to be 100% in conformance to the standards under: Leadership; Legal Requirements; Govern-** (Continued on p 8)

### Environmental Concerns: Recycling Scrap Paper

Wonder where those scrap paper tablets come from? Scrap paper is regularly put aside by staff. After graduating from medical school I served eight years on active duty with the U.S. Navy, leaving for civilian practice as a board certified obstetrician/gynecologist, joining the Katonah, NY, Medical Group to start the department of OB/GYN. I was on the staff of the Northern Westchester Medical Center and served as the Chief of the OB/GYN service for 15 years prior to retirement. I am also retired from the Naval Reserve. I am an elder in the United Presbyterian Church, USA, and have been active in my local church as well as on area committees and have served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Hudson River. ### Melvin Schuster

I grew up in Brooklyn in a time that people have come to call its Golden Age even though it included some years of depression and wars. The war was on; I enlisted in the Marines. It was before graduation but they did not call me until the September following. After the war, upon returning from Japan and being discharged, I entered Brooklyn College from lack of any special goal and because the college was near my home. What I learned there was that the life it offered, of study and learning, was an overriding interest for me. Three semesters later, I transferred to the University of Chicago with its wonderful, incredible, exciting intellectual atmosphere. It was in the air, and I can still recall my euphoria as I breathed it in, sometimes in clumsy gulps. I studied in the Philosophy Department and the Committee on Social Thought and, had I the means, I might have spent my entire life there just studying. I left Chicago for a position at the University of Puerto Rico, where the Dean's first words to me were, "How's your Spanish coming?" I was expected to teach in Spanish. Three years later I moved to Boston University and stayed there for 36 years, during which period I taught a year in a college in Kuala



Lumpur and another year at the Flemish campus of the university in Brussels. I had married and started a family in Chicago. My wife died last summer, just after our 62nd anniversary. I have a son on the West Coast whose work has taken him to Europe and Asia; a daughter on the East Coast, who is an art teacher; and a daughter in Oberlin who teaches art at the College. Oh yes, I enjoy playing cribbage.

### Arnold “Arn” and Beth Lewis

**Arn:** Born in western Pennsylvania to immigrant Welsh parents; early childhood spent there and in Wales. After Allegheny College, he began grad school in 1952 in Russian studies but became more intrigued with art, resulting in a shift to art history at Wisconsin. There he began to realize that an academic campus was paradise on earth. He also began to grow up socially and politically. After army service in Germany, Arn returned to Wisconsin, where he met and happily married Beth, a grad student in European history. They enjoyed a delayed but magical honeymoon from 1959 to 1961 on a Fulbright grant studying in Bonn, Munich, Paris and London. Teaching art history began at Wells Col-

lege. In 1964 they moved to the College of Wooster, an admirable, encouraging institution. Arn wrote a number of books on the cultural implications of architecture but valued teaching as more important and meaningful. Yet classes in the history of art posed a challenge. Why maunder on about the water lilies of Monet when the world was packed with injustice? Attempting to justify his professional path, he often talked about the moral and ethical lessons that art revealed and, in spare time, worked for civil rights and justice causes. Retirement was initially difficult. Teaching had been an act of service; suddenly there was no one waiting to be served. Arn was rescued in 1996 by Wooster’s remarkable free-health clinic where he became a custodian for 14 years. Their three lively, thoughtful children raised their parents well. Children now live in Copenhagen and New York City, all of them architects and all married to architects.

The good fortune of Arn’s early years continued throughout his life. The move to Kendal is the capstone of that good fortune. Everyone should be entitled to Kendal

**Beth:** Born in Mashad, the holy city of Shiite Islam in Iran, I experienced the life of missionary kids: home schooling (Calvert); boarding school in Tehran (many refugees -- white Russians, Polish, Czech, German and Iraqi Jews --

25 nationalities); high school in Kansas. When I was 12, I spent a year as the only western child in Mashad, reading every book I could find, especially a multi-volume set of world history. Though I did not realize it, this set the course that has dominated my academic life, from a history major at the College of Wooster to MA and PhD in modern European history at the University of Wisconsin.

The best moment of my life was Arn’s rescuing me from my books. Married in 1958, our mutual life in scholarship began with Arn’s Fulbright year, after which we drove to Mashad so Arn could meet my parents. Arn’s teaching at Wells College was followed by a move to create an art-history program at Wooster. As part of his job, we drove with eight-month-old twins and a four-year-old daughter to Beirut in 1967, only to be evacuated in the June war. Given nepotism in the 1960s, I became an independent scholar. My dissertation on the political world of George Grosz was published in 1971 and reprinted 1991. In the 1980s, while working in the college administration, I was a visiting professor four times at the University of California and then spent three years in the 1990s in residence at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, NJ, working with a colleague on a number of publications, including a book on war posters from the Hoover collection. My final book, on the public reception of art in late-19th century Germany, was published in 2003. My hope for being in Kendal is to learn to speak Farsi again, play Bach’s two- and three-part inventions, master the long-form in Tai Chi, knit and read and read....

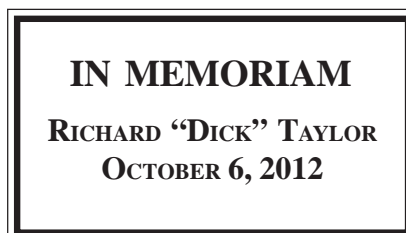
