## More About Kendal Residents

### Marilyn F. Burns

I was born and raised in Springfield, VT, and graduated from the University of Vermont with a degree in zoology. Study for a Certificate in Physical Therapy from Simmons College, Boston, was made possible by a scholarship from the March of Dimes. Polio was rampant and they were desperate for therapists. My first job was at Children's Medical Center, Boston; the second at Mary Hitchcock Hospital, Hanover, NH, now Dartmouth Hitchcock Hospital. While there I met Dartmouth graduate and Navy veteran Robert Burns who was working in my hometown. Hanover was his hometown; his father was a Dartmouth professor. We were married one year later. Cynthia and Andrew were born while we lived in Springfield but a consulting job sent us to Pampa, TX, then to Wellesley, MA. In 1965 Bob joined Western Electric in North Andover, MA, and we moved to Andover to an old house built in 1811 and 1831, enjoying it for 47 years. When the children were older, I worked part-time at Lawrence General Hospital and at

the Cerebral Palsy Training Center in Lawrence, MA. We did a little traveling in retirement. Downsizing to a more supportive environment became necessary, and, after one false start, we moved to Oberlin in 2013 to be near son Andrew, his wife Nancy Darling, and grandsons Ian and Sean. Cynthia and husband Neal Martin live in New Hampshire and Maine. Bob's health failed dramatically in 2015 and he passed away in hospice care in September 2015. My interests include people (everyone has a story); nature, including bird watching; art, music, history, genealogy, tai chi and reading. I have led Girl Scouts and volunteered at the Andover Thrift Shop and at the Andover Historical Society as a board member, president and later editor of their newsletter. Church has always been important. I am very happy to be at Kendal.

### Doug and Sandi McClennen

**Doug:** I was born in Cambridge, MA, in 1934. My father moved us to Ann Arbor, MI, in 1940, when he became a professor of English at the University of Michigan.

After graduating from U of M in 1956, I taught English at a private school in Baltimore. I returned to U of M in 1962, and earned a PhD in psychology in 1967. During that time, I courted and married Sandi. I taught at Wayne State University from 1967 to 1973. From 1973 to 1980 I worked as a psychologist in a variety of settings. In 1981, I began a career as a freelance technical writer and trainer, mostly for the auto industry. After I retired in 1998, I became a volunteer civil and domestic mediator for the Wayne County, MI, court system. Sandi and I married in 1966. We have two children and four grandchildren. From 1972 through 2015 we spent summers on our cruising sailboat. For the first 25 years, we cruised the East Coast from the Connecticut River to Mount Desert, ME, in a 25-foot sailboat. In 1996, we bought a bigger boat (28 feet to accommodate our children and grandchildren (not all at once). For 20 years, we sailed this boat in the northern reaches of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron.

I have also been a folk singer for over 50 years. In recent years I have been on the board of directors of a local folk singing society and have performed regularly at "open mic" concerts. I hope to share music with friends at Kendal. I have also built three day sailboats (including one of my own design) and a number of pieces of furniture. I am looking forward to doing more woodworking in the Kendal woodshop. I swim for exercise and am looking forward to finding swim buddies.



I have a genetic hearing loss. Hearing aids in both ears help, but I may ask you to speak more slowly and for additional help with names and numbers, since there is no context and my brain cannot fill in the consonants I cannot hear, even with hearing aids.

## Attempted Homicide in the Arboretum

***"Red was an unfortunate one, assigned to the basement flat with the ground level up over his trunk. G.R. came around and attempted to strangle him."***

This is the frequently found scene here at The John Bartram Arboretum, especially among our red maples. Planted too low and mulched up too high, the suffocating tree develops G.R. (Girdling Roots) in a desperate attempt to get water, air and nutrition. Wanting to help, G.R. surrounds the tree trunk, but as the trunk grows those roots become tighter and tighter, strangling the tree. We have many such trees here at Kendal and are beginning to remedy some.

When Barbara Thomas gave permission for the Tree Commission Academy to meet for eight days in the Kendal Education Center Building, she could not have imagined what a win-win situation that would be.

The TCA has not only trained six of our arboretum workers, but has led to further education and demonstration work being carried out here.

## Kendal Resident Rights and Responsibilities

Are you aware of your rights and responsibilities as a Kendal resident?

Your rights are based on the mission and values of Kendal at Oberlin and cover three areas: medical, cares and concerns, and privacy and safety.

Your responsibilities are those that will help Kendal meet your health care needs and provide you with appropriate care.

As a reminder of these important points, you will be receiving a copy of both lists (via email or in your open mailbox). If you have any questions as you review your resident rights and responsibilities, call Kim Peters or Kim Preston in Social Services.

In addition, we will be listing some of these points in *The Kendalight* over the next few months. This month, we list some of your rights as a KatO resident:

1. To receive considerate, respectful and compassionate care that promotes dignity, privacy, safety and comfort regardless of gender identity, sexual orientation, religious belief, race, nationality, age, ability, and sources of payment.
2. To receive medically appropriate services and treatment within Kendal's mission and policies, and applicable laws and regulations.
3. To request assistance when visual or hearing impairments affect communication.
4. To receive appropriate assessment and management of pain and symptoms.
5. To have family members or representatives of your choice and your own physician notified promptly of your admission to a hospital.
6. To know the names and roles of the people treating you and to request a second opinion or a change of physicians without fear of reprisal.
7. To examine and receive an explanation of your bill and to be informed of available payment methods.
8. To know of business relationships that Kendal has that may influence your treatment and care.
9. To be transferred to another facility as recommended or requested and to be informed of risks, benefits and alternatives to transfer.

**Note:** When residents are admitted to the Stephens Care Center, the version of rights is modified as approved by the State of Ohio for residents residing in a nursing home.

## Have You Had Your Annual Medicare Physical?

Every Kendal resident is allowed an annual wellness exam paid for by Medicare. This 45-60 min. exam can be completed by your Kendal physician or our Health and Wellness Clinic Nurse Practitioner. It consists of a review of systems and a health risk assessment. Your medications and immunizations will be reviewed and several health screenings will occur. Please bring your medications with you, including any over-the-counter supplements, so that your medication record can be updated. If you are a Kendal resident who has a non-Kendal physician, we encourage you to see your primary care provider for your annual Medicare wellness exam. However, you are entitled to an annual review by our Nurse Practitioner who will perform a medication and immunization review along with several health screenings and a modified physical exam. Any data collected can be forwarded to your primary care provider. Our HWC secretary will telephone you when it is time for your annual exam. Medicare requires that the exam occur one year and one day past the last exam. This exam is important because it allows us to focus on wellness rather than illness and to identify any possible health issues before they become an issue.

## An Invitation to Become an AARP Tax Aide

AARP Tax-Aide, a free, volunteer-run tax preparation service, is seeking volunteers for the coming tax season. Good interpersonal skills are important, but you don't need to be a math whiz to help!

Training occurs on weekdays in January. Classes cover areas of federal returns of particular importance to older and lower-to-middle income taxpayers, including pensions, IRAs, sale of stock and homes, itemized deductions, earned income credit and child tax credit.

After training, you will take an open-book test to become certified. You will then be assigned to one of 11 Lorain County sites to prepare returns, working at least four daytime hours a week between February 1 and April 15, 2017. (You can arrange short absences.)

Tax-Aide, sponsored by AARP in cooperation with the IRS, has assisted seniors and low-to-middle income taxpayers for more than 40 years. 
